Good morning...

Chairman Wicker, Ranking Member Reed, and distinguished members of this committee – as the proud son of a career Army Officer and Vietnam Veteran, and the grandson of a World War II veteran in the Pacific, I am honored ... and humbled ... by the opportunity to appear before you today.

I would like to first thank the President of the United States, the Secretary of Defense and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for their trust and confidence in nominating me to serve as the next Commander of U.S. Central Command.

I am also honored to join today with Lt Gen Alexus Grynkewich. We all know him by his callsign... "Grynch." Having served alongside him for the last 4 years, he is THE VERY BEST our nation has to offer. I am joined today by my wife, Susan, my high school sweetheart from Montgomery, Alabama, and the anchor of our family. With the right combination of resolve, innovation, and partnership with our vast network of friends, we can deter and defeat threats to our country long before they ever reach our shores. I would like to acknowledge and thank the current Commander of U.S. Central Command, General Erik Kurilla, his wife and family for their lifetime of service to our country. Our nation and our troops in the Middle East have been blessed to have General Kurilla at the helm of Central Command for the past 39 months.

Finally, I would like to thank this Committee for your steadfast support and commitment to the oversight that makes our force stronger. If confirmed, I pledge to maintain a transparent and fully responsive relationship with this committee. I look forward to your questions today. Thank you.
